**Program Chairman for April, Larry Goodloe** introduced our speaker for today, Mr. Joe Aull. Joe is now the Vice President of Operations at the Wentworth Military Academy. Joe is a long time School teacher and administrator of Lexington School District and served very capably as a Missouri State Representative for 8 years. Joe spoke of his experience as a State Representative and friend of Bob Nance, our local State Representative. They had much in common as Joe said, "I was a Democrat and Bob was a Republican but in the Missouri General assembly it was more about rural representatives versus urban representatives."



Joe gave us a great program about Wentworth Military Academy in Lexington. He talked about WMA and his role as Vice president of Operations. The school is both a high school (7-12) and Junior College. There are about 100 in High School and 200 in Junior college, and then about 500 commuters. WMA has started a new trend in that they no longer use text books, all have laptop computers and their curriculum is computer driven, a very neat concept. It costs \$30,000 a year for a student to attend WMA and he said that is pretty much in tune with other boarding schools. He also advised WMA has a summer program called Camp Lead a 6 week session.
